


# Wick St Fergus Church of Scotland



## <u>April 2018</u>

Welcome, everyone, to April. At any other time I would talk about the arrival of Spring and snowdrops and daffodils and lambs but since the weather hasn't been what one could call "cooperative" then I will simply say that you should keep an extra semmit on until May at least. I am writing this piece at the beginning of Holy Week. This, as we all know, begins the day before Christmas and its beginning is heralded by the arrival of the first crème eggs in Tesco. Now the more astute of you will recognise that this is, of course, nonsense. Whether you accept the biblical accounts of the first Holy Week as historical or if you see them as symbolic, it doesn't really matter. The meaning behind the events is important. The week begins with Christ's entry into Jerusalem on what came to be called Palm Sunday.

Palm branches were waved and coats were placed on the road. People sang Psalms and for some reason it upset the "leaders" of the people. They instructed Jesus to tell the crowds to shut up. Imagine it, ordinary people praying and singing hymns in an unsupervised, haphazard fashion! What kind of anarchy is this? They could stray into heresy! That's what they thought. But Jesus once told them that if they destroyed the Temple that he would raise it after three days. He went on to explain that he was talking about the Temple of his body. Since in Jesus we get to know God as God with a human face, God among us, any attempt to concentrate worship and access to God in the hands of a few people was wrong. Christ came to signal the beginning of a new moral, spiritual order. In the new order access to God would be open to all. And what one truly believed about God would be matched by actions; so Jesus responds by rebuking the leaders instead of the crowds. Jesus said, "If they keep quiet the stones would yell out." Nobody has the right to place barriers between you and God, not me, not anyone. A week later he is betrayed by one of his best friends on Maundy Thursday. He institutes Communion and even the one who was going to betray him is offered bread and wine.

It is a similar lesson to Palm Sunday. No one is excluded from God's grace. When we celebrate Communion as we do at St Fergus I always include the phrase, "Come to this table, those of you who have tried to follow Jesus and those of you who have failed." We keep an open table at St Fergus and all are welcome. No one is turned away. Someone once told me that they were too big of a disappointment as a person to be admitted to Communion. They were too much of a failure to be loved or admitted to a Kirk. It broke my heart that they had been told that. Speaking only for ourselves I can say that all are welcome and no one is turned away because Jesus never turned anyone away.

Good Friday comes next. Traditionally all lights were shaded in Churches on Good Friday. This is to symbolise the sky going dark as Jesus died on the cross. But if you ever thought of God as someone distant from you then the events of this day should tell you otherwise. Jesus truly proved that he was one of us, that he was God with a human face. He fully identified with our darkest moments as he cried out, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" Yet he still found time to comfort the thief crucified next to him. He found time to organise his grieving mother's welfare. He found time to comfort the grieving wives of Jerusalem. He found time!!!! He still finds time.

But the darkness thought that it had him beaten. However, three days later he rose from the grave, thumbed his nose at death and fear and anxiety and gave them the "Spanish Archer" of the "El-bow." He comforts the grieving Mary and he comforts his disciples. He doesn't berate them for their lack of faith because he experienced that for himself as he hung on the cross. This Easter he comes to you. It doesn't matter how far you have drifted away, how skeptical you have become or how hurt you have been by unthinking professionally religious people in the past. There will always be a place for you in the community of faith that is Wick St Fergus Church of Scotland. If you want to know more come and see us.
