


# Wick St Fergus Church of Scotland



# February 2016

Welcome to February, it is one of my favourite months of the year. For one thing, it is the month in which I was born. Not that I am dropping hints or anything, but the twenty fourth of the month is significant in this regard. Times like this are often times for looking back. Birthdays can be a time of reflection, a time for considering how the years have affected you.

The last weekend in January was significant for me because it represented another kind of anniversary i.e. the eighth anniversary of the day when I got off the bus from Glasgow and set foot on the sacred turf of Wick. There I was met by Rev. Ronnie Johnstone who was our interim moderator the time. He took me to Mackay's Hotel for a meal before taking me immediately to my first ever Kirk Session meeting.

That was my introduction to Wick. I only came for two weeks and here I am eight years later. And what an eight years it has been! I am half the man I was then (that's down to the diet). But what I want to say is that this is a great community. The people of Wick are generous, kind, welcoming and are committed to their community. Your support for what we are trying to do at Wick St Fergus Kirk is encouraging. But it is the people of Wick who are the stars of this tale.

Organisations like the Wick Society, Wick Players, the RNLI, the folks who work at both our hospitals. Folks like you build a community that is worth preserving and developing for make no mistake, we don't want to simply survive. We need to grow in what has been termed "Community capacity." This simply means that we need to deal with the negative sides of what is around us rather than assuming that everything is hunky-dory. Where we are, as a community, has taken a great deal of work. Things like domestic violence, illegal drugs, chemically enhanced crime, homophobia, violence against women, apathy towards our wonderful young people and casual racism masquerading as banter.

So how do we maintain and develop healthy communities? Jesus had a number of important things to say about this, particularly in that manifesto for healthy communities called the Sermon on the Mount. He said in Matthew 7:12: *In everything do to others as you would have them do to you, for this is the law and the prophets.* This is sometimes referred to as the Golden Rule. How we deal with and speak to and about one another can have either a healing effect, bringing unity to our community, or it can have a detrimental effect, bringing civic discord. St Paul also wrote in his letter to the Galationas 6:2: *Bear one another's burdens and so fulfil the law of Christ.* Interestingly, this applies to people from all kinds of backgrounds and not just folks like us. Words like those from Christ and St Paul can be found in the Holy Literature of many religious traditions as well as in philosophies and social manifesto.

Someone said to me recently: *That's all very well, John, but we have become so politically correct that it isn't possible to slag someone off any more.* To that person, and to all who agree with him, I would say this: if your sense of self-worth and integrity and equilibrium depend on you being able to use humour to demean others, however well intended, then perhaps a period of self-examination (and maybe counselling) might do you the world of good. One thing is certain, though, and that is that Wick is a great place to live and grow. And Wick St Fergus is an inclusive and affirming community of believers in the Lord Jesus. He never turned away anyone, no matter their background of racial origin or economic status of gender affinity. At Wick St Fergus our manifesto is the life, death and resurrection of the joiner from Nazareth. Come and see us sometime, you know where we are.


### **Guild Report Jan 25 2016**

Ask the Minister: This is the first of a new occasional feature, in which I will attempt to answer questions that are put to me. The questions can be on anything at all. If you have a question that you would like answered then please pass it either to me or Michelle, our editor. Today's question comes from Curious, Ackergill. "Is it more important to be right that to be kind?"

Answer: A good question. Curious? No it isn't. The reduction of matters of faith to a series of statements to which one must agree is a fairly recent one. In the early days of the Church it was sufficient to publicly state that Jesus was one's Lord. This in turn was validated by how one treated others such as the poor, orphans, prisoners, the sick, the excluded and so on. It was also validated by how one treated other members of the family of faith. Conversely, if one spoke to someone in a way that was unchristlike or if one treated someone in a way that did not reflect Jesus then ones stated acknowledgment of Jesus as Lord was suspect. I John tells us that God is love and John1 tells us that Jesus is God made flesh and blood. Therefore the life of Christ is our model for living. As with Christ and the adulterous woman in John 8, he forgave her and showed her mercy before she asked for mercy. Even though the law demanded that she be stoned he refused to participate in or give credence to blind prejudice or injustice, no matter whether it was legal or not. It is therefore more important to be kind that to be right.

**Report on Christmas Tree Festival:** The 3<sup>rd</sup> annual tree festival was a great success raising £445.99 with many groups represented and some have rebooked for this year.
