


Wick St Fergus Church of Scotland

This month's leader article has a strange, bittersweet quality to it. Last month Wick St Fergus Church of Scotland lost one of the finest Christian souls it has ever been my privilege to serve with. Margaret Crowe passed away on the morning of Tuesday the 20th of April. But Margaret was more than simply another cancer statistic. Margaret was a shining example of what it meant to be a Christian in today's post-modern world. She wasn't afraid to embrace or at least examine new ideas and she also appreciated the value of history and so didn't throw the baby out with the bath water, as it were.

Discussions with Margaret and her beloved husband, Leslie, around her kitchen table over her incredible homemade soup and sandwiches, liberally laced with her out-of-this-world tomato chutney, ranged from the Kirk's history of exclusion towards LGBT folks to the Kirk's heating system. Margaret was both knowledgeable and enquiring. Let me assure you, she wasn't afraid to ask questions. Together with Leslie they formed a formidable team and from them I learned all about what it meant to be dedicated to the cause of Christ in this place. They were among the strongest supporters that not only I but also my two predecessors, Stuart Frizzel and Stephen Thompson, had.

This former operating theatre nurse knew how to calm the often short temper of this emotional Minister (me that is) and always provided a ready ear and shoulder for listening and leaning purposes. Margaret also had the incredible ability to puncture pomposity and she knew how to bring me back down to earth when I became "up myself" with delusions of grandeur. She could read me like a book. Margaret was the kind of woman who, according to my grandmother, could see through a wall in time. That such a brave, strong and sensitive woman should succumb to cancer, a scourge she had previously defeated, is an injustice that makes me want to scream towards the heavens at how unfair our existence in this world is, at the injustice of it all. And if Margaret ever felt like that you would never have guessed it. Her first thoughts were always for others.

Both Margaret and Leslie worked with me on many of the weddings I conducted here in the Kirk and she was always there for the often nervous grooms who stood waiting with trepidation on their future wives. And if they were still "tired and emotional" after self-medicating the night before then lots of black coffee was available. When my own mother passed away the first folks who called to see how I was were Margaret and Leslie. Actually the first people I met from the Kirk when I arrived from Glasgow back in 2009 were Margaret and Leslie. Ronnie Johnstone and I knocked on the Manse door in Miller Avenue and it was opened by Margaret. And from both Margaret and Leslie I was reminded of a very important lesson in true Christian spirituality. You can go to a Kirk for years, have been on Kirk Sessions, committees, stood up to preach and have an encyclopaedic knowledge of Church lore but unless how you deal with others is your main evidence then all claims of being a Christian are pretensions. I can honestly say that we are all going to miss them both very much.

Margaret was special. She still is special and will remain special in our memories. And if I can be selfish for a moment, I am going to miss her. I won't be able to attend the funeral but I want to finish this wee tribute in the way that I would if I were conducting her passing from this world to the next: And so, Margaret, we release you into your well-deserved rest. Be received as an honoured daughter knowing that your welcome is assured. In the Salvation Army they used to speak of being promoted to glory. You have received your well-earned promotion. Well done thou good and faithful servant. It's time to go on home.
