## 1 Corinthians 12:27

By the time that you good folks of Wick and district read this month's newsletter we will have formally welcomed Pulteneytown Parish Church's new minister, the Revd Stuart Farmes. I am really looking forward to

being the preacher for the evening at his ordination and induction on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of November.

Occasions like this are among the few times when all of God's people come together from across what seems to be an impossible religious divide. All of the Kirks in Caithness Presbytery will be there as will representatives from Kirks from other traditions. I always look forward to meeting with folks like Father John Allan from St Joachim's and getting to have a yarn with Revd Wendy Knott from the Episcopal Church and Revd Bill Ferguson from the Baptist Church. These occasions are far too infrequent.

The division of the community of faith here in Scotland and elsewhere is also a cause for great sadness. Some Kirks refuse to recognise the valid and crucial contributions that are made to the life of the nation by the various Christian traditions. Some Kirks live on warped memories of the past, viewing other traditions through lenses that are just out of focus. Yet others think that the Reformation in Scotland only just happened, or so it would seem. And there are even some who would cast doubt on the validity of another tradition's spirituality. Such people often cast such doubts, generally on people who disagree with them. And such people miss out on so much.

<u>The fact is that we don't have to agree.</u> We do not all fulfil the same function and so we need one another in order to gain a true, overall picture of the magnificence that is God revealed in the joiner from Nazareth. An old, faithful believer once wrote the following prayer <u>From the cowardice that shrinks from new truth, from the laziness that is content with half truth, from the arrogance that thinks it has all the truth -- Oh, God of truth, deliver us.</u> We need one another's insights and the experience that each of us brings to the Christian faith and the interpretation of the Bible otherwise the result is bigotry. And bigotry has no place in the Church! Like St Paul said, if the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be and if the whole body were and ear, where would the sense of smell be? I do not have the option of saying to my sisters and brothers in other Kirks that I don't need them.

That is one reason why I am thankful that right at the very beginning of Wick St Fergus Church we committed ourselves in our vision statement to work together with other congregations of God's people.

And so to Stuart I say, "Welcome to Wick, I look forward to working with you." To my sisters and brothers in

the other Kirks in the area I say, "Thank you for being where you are, for being the presence of Christ in our town and district. Let's get together more often." **Together we are the body of Christ and God has not left us. Let's talk soon.**

Participating in, or organizing community events to get the congregation actively involved with the wider community and allow the wider community to experience St Fergus Church and its work.

To demonstrate proper financial governance within St Fergus, ensuring we meet the OSCR guidelines set for UK/Scottish Charities.

To publicise the work of the committee within the congregation and in the wider community.

Please remember we are always looking for members of the committee, although we are a large committee, we have a very ambitious programme throughout the year and all help and assistance is welcome and of course your ideas. We are always looking at innovative ways of presenting our church to the wider community.

We have just undertaken a very successful Harvest Open Day which raised £615 for the Charity "Kidney Kids Scotland". For the first time we have set up an account to enable people anywhere (whether via our website or posters) to give to our causes by using "Just Text Giving", this method of giving was explained in the October newsletter. We intend to set up a similar scheme for the Christmas Charity and set it running from the 1<sup>st</sup> December.
