


Wick St Fergus Church of Scotland

Hello people of Wick and district. This is your friendly, neighbourhood minister with the November issue of our Kirk magazine. I am sure that you are all becoming very excited about the arrival of Christmas. Advent Sunday is on the second of December this year. It represents the beginning of the old Church year and is a time of looking forward to the coming of Christ.

The Sunday preceding Advent Sunday used to be known as The Feast of Christ the King. This represented the end of the old Church year and was therefore a time of looking back. It was a time of remembering, a time of reflection, a time for the Church to remind itself what it was all about. And there is no harm in doing this year after year. When you get to my time of life it is good to have wee reminders of things. This is what the Feast of Christ the King has traditionally done for the Church. Readings from the New Testament would be given concerning Jesus ministry and how he conducted himself. The people would be reminded about the character of Christ and how he was no ordinary King or Emperor. T he Church would be reminded, because it needs reminding at times, that it exists for others. Jesus once said that the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many. St Paul speaks in his letter to the Philippians of how Jesus became one of us and of how he appeared among us in the form of a servant. Paul goes on to speak about how Christ literally emptied himself and made himself to be of no reputation. And at the beginning of the passage he instructs his readers to have the same mind as Christ.

Now some of you may be thinking: John, I thought that you said Jesus was a King. I did indeed say that. But what you need to understand is that Christ's authority did not consist of ordering people around. He wasn't some kind of cosmic dictator who stood over humanity, watching for every little mistake and judging people accordingly. Instead he shared our weaknesses, our foibles. He became tired and upset and hungry and thirsty just like we do. His authority consisted not in issuing edicts. Instead his authority emerged from the very depths of his character and we know from 1 John 4:7-8 that in his being, God is love. And the New Testament says in another place that we love because God first loved us.

Christ's authority consists in not taking advantage of his authority, in sharing in our pain and weakness. When St Paul was on his way to Damascus to persecute the fledgling Christian community there he was thrown to the ground and he heard a voice that said: Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me? Stunned by the event, Saul (as he was known at that time) responded by saying: who are you Lord, that I am supposed to be persecuting? The voice responded and said: It is me, Jesus, whom you are persecuting. So close is Jesus to us that he shares our pain. There is never a moment when we are truly alone when the dark times come, when the shadows grow long and the nights grow cold. Why? The great King of all Kings is coming, and he comes with mercy and welcome. This is the King we remember at the end of the month. This is the King whose coming we remember in Advent. If you want to know more about this King then please contact me or come and see us. You know where we are.

Following the opening devotions, she was very pleased to welcome back Barbara Nicol and the Arion Choir with accompanist Norma Sinclair. The choir delighted the Guild members with a wonderful selection of musical items from familiar Scottish songs, songs from the Shows, and nostalgic items which had Guild members enthusiastically joining in. All this was interspersed with poems from choir

members Lesley Hendry and Marjory Richard. It was a super night which closed with a welcome cuppa.

8th October - The Guild business meeting was led by Janet McDonald. Following a hymn, reading and prayer, it was time to turn attention to Guild matters, both national and local. The accounts were discussed/agreed and treasurer Dinah Sutherland explained how much money was left to distribute from the current year's funds. It was agreed to donate £200 to the church and £100 each to two Guild Projects *Malawi Fruits Growing the Future* who will provide solar pumps, access to tractors and give support to young people to grow cash crops using modern methods and *The Free to Live Trust's Seema's Project,* which aims to rescue children from the red light district of Pune in India and provide accommodation and a future for them. The Guild is very grateful to the members of the congregation who donated to the retiring offering following the Guild Sunday service. It was not all business because the Guild thespians Maureen, Dorothy and Nancy acted out a couple of dramas on the Guild theme of *One Journey, Many Roads* in their own inimitable ways. The rounds of applause were well deserved.
